The results show that frequent application and heightened threat levels are linked to increased concerns about rights violations. Public support correlates with reduced perceived infringements, while privacy concerns have a strong negative impact. Awareness of legal protections helps mitigate these concerns. The study highlights the need for a balanced approach to anti-terrorism legislation, emphasizing the importance of safeguarding individual rights while addressing security threats.*

Interpretation

Frequency of Law Application ($B = 0.12$, $Beta = 0.22$): This variable has a positive effect on the impact of anti-terrorism laws on fundamental rights, indicating that increased frequency of application is associated with a higher perceived impact. The effect is statistically significant ($p = 0.018$).

Perceived Threat Level ($B = 0.25$, $Beta = 0.35$): Higher perceived threat levels are positively associated with the perceived impact of anti-terrorism laws. This effect is significant ($p < 0.001$), suggesting that greater perceived threats lead to a stronger impact of these laws on fundamental rights.

Public Support ($B = -0.08$, $Beta = -0.15$): The negative coefficient indicates that higher public support is associated with a lower perceived impact of anti-terrorism laws. This effect is significant ($p = 0.049$), suggesting that increased public support may mitigate the perceived negative impact on fundamental rights.

Privacy Concerns ($B = -0.30$, $Beta = -0.45$): Privacy concerns have a strong negative effect on the perceived impact of anti-terrorism laws, with higher concerns associated with a greater perceived infringement on fundamental rights. This effect is highly significant ($p < 0.001$).

Awareness of Legal Protections ($B = 0.20$, $Beta = 0.25$): Increased awareness of legal protections is positively associated with the perceived impact of anti-terrorism laws. This variable is significant ($p < 0.001$), indicating that greater awareness of protections may influence perceptions of how these laws impact fundamental rights.

In summary, the regression analysis reveals that perceived threat level, privacy concerns, and awareness of legal protections significantly influence the perceived impact of anti-terrorism laws on fundamental rights. Public support for these measures and the frequency of law application also play significant roles, though their effects are more nuanced.
